While it is widely believed that Cosmos will be victorious in his bid for asylum, many are saying this will galvanize support the President's alien registration act.

In anticipation of today's ruling the White House Press Secretary Jill Wessell issued this statement:

JILL WESSELL

The President wishes Cosmos luck in his hearing.

JILL WESSELL (CONT'D)

He feels that for all of the media attention and commentary that the system is working exactly as it should.

(then)

If Cosmos is able to convince the courts that he belongs here, then he will be welcomed, the same as any other alien invader.

(then)

However, in the meantime since President Ames's order has been in effect, America is setting record lows in crime rates and villainous activity.

(then)

We can say that this policy is working. Those that oppose it are inviting this planet to become a rest stop for any sort of parasite, monster or humanoid.

(then)

Luckily for us, this is a country built on the law. Each executive agency will see those laws enforced, no matter who breaks them.

DEIRDRE WILSON

While the country waits in anticipation, Cosmos' attorney Phil Axiom has continued to pass along Cosmos's message of hope, that this trial has opened a window into the plight of many aliens like him who have no world to return to.

UNDERWRITER

That was Deirdre Wilson reporting from Washington. It's 73 degrees here in Paradise City. Coming up next is These American Supers...

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ACT ONE

50 INT. TAS STUDIO

In the studio.

ETHAN

From QSPZ Baltimore, it's These American Supers. With the nation holding its breath on the result of The United States v. Cosmos, it seems that everywhere you turn, people are discussing the issue of Alien Rights.

(then)

It has been an extraordinary and uncertain time for many of our fellow citizens.

(then)

And normally I'd have an anecdote or story to share with you at the top. But instead I thought it best to let aliens speak for themselves.

(then)

So, today on our program, "Aliens in America."

(then)

Act One, "The Alien Hunter". Hailey Frond has the story

Music.

HAILEY FROND

Sam Danielewski can find anyone. Anywhere. All you have to do is show them a picture, and they'll lead you straight to the person.

SAM DANIELEWSKI

It's not exact. I can get it down to like ten yards. And it's not like I see it on a map in my head. It's like I'm a compass and when I think about it I just...

Aside.

HAILEY FROND

Sam closes their eyes and points off into the distance. You can tell they're drawn to something.

Back to recording.

HAILEY FROND (CONT'D) Who are you thinking about right

now?

SAM DANIELEWSKI

Katrina Roberts. From third grade. She used to play hide and seek with me.

HAILEY FROND

I bet you were pretty good.

SAM DANIELEWSKI

Oh. I was a God.

They laugh. Music.

HAILEY FROND

As an adult Sam put their powers to good use, working search and rescue with the National Parks Service.

SAM DANIELEWSKI

Before I joined, about 1600 people a year would get lost in National Parks, and they'd recover about half of them. Once I joined we got that up to 100.

HAILEY FROND

You mean you'd save 100 more people?

SAM DANIELEWSKI

100 percent. We got them all.

HAILEY FROND

Wow.

SAM DANIELEWSKI

Yeah. We'd get faxes coming in from all over.

(then)

Twenty, thirty a day sometimes in the summer. But it was great. I had my own space, a little team under me. We did good work under the radar. Well until...

(then)

7/20.

SFX: Helicopter.

BEN BELTZER

Manhattan is gone. There's no sign of radiation or explosives. It's just gone...

HAILEY FROND

Sam packed a bag and flew to New York the second they heard about it. They were among the first responders.

SAM DANIELEWSKI

It was the biggest search and rescue operation in the world. They had us divided into seven camps, there were other diviners in the field. But really it wasn't hard to find someone who needed help.

HAILEY FROND

These camps of psychics came alive in the days that followed as the list of missing continued to grow. Relatives, friends would come into these camps trying to find out if their loved ones were still alive.

SAM DANIELEWSKI

Unfortunately my power doesn't work that way.

(then)

I mostly helped them find the bodies.

HAILEY FROND

By the end of the week, Sam had helped to locate over a hundred survivors.

SAM DANIELEWSKI

Which was something. I try to think about the good we were able to do and not about the bad news we had to deliver.

(then)

And we, got a commendation from the President. That was something. Afterwards I went back to the Parks Department and normal life.

(adding)

Or so I thought.

Music.

HAILEY FROND

Sam spent the next year or so back in their office in Boulder, but from time to time, something unusual would happen.

SAM DANIELEWSKI

I started getting these special case files from outside the department. "Green Files" we'd call them. Because that's how they came when they delivered them.

HAILEY FROND

And what were they?

SAM DANIELEWSKI

They said they were missing person files. And that's a little harder for me because the Green Files were usually people in cities.

(then)

It's one thing when I tell a helicopter which mountain someone is stuck on, it's another when I have to pinpoint what floor of a building someone is on.

(then)

But I found them. Pretty soon they brought in a full time liaison and we worked out a system. We had topographical maps, blueprints, and with the internet it got even faster. And it felt good. After 7/20 I was looking to help as many people as I could. And the Green Files kept on coming. Soon it was half my caseload, and it kept growing.

HAILEY FROND

How many of those green files would you say you got over the years.

SAM DANIELEWSKI

In five years, it was over...
 (choked up)

It was over twenty thousand people I helped them find. But then there was Lei Bea. She was a green file that was brought to me in 2016. The files for kids stick out.

(then)

SAM DANIELEWSKI (CONT'D)

I found her right away in New Orleans. And got the confirmation that they found her safely. But with a name like that, it sticks in your head a little.

(then)

It was a couple months later when I brought her up at a party and I thought about her. I normally feel the person east or west, but this time, it was up.

HAILEY FROND

They had pinged her off world. A first for them.

SAM DANIELEWSKI

Yeah. And that made me curious. Usually after I find someone I just toss the file in the out box and the liaison would collect them at the end of the day.

(then)

But I started keeping some of them in my desk after they were found. And in the next few months it seemed that a lot of them were going off world or to the same building in El Paso Texas which was...

(then)

An ICE detention center.

HAILEY FROND

From there, Sam realized that they were part of an effort by Immigration and Custom Enforcement's Space Invaders program. This was a wide effort by ICE to locate and deport illegal aliens from other planets. Which is hard to hear considering...

SAM DANIELEWSKI

I'm an alien. My grandparents came here as refugees in the fifties from the Kuiper Belt. That's where my powers come from. And they knew that.

HAILEY FROND

When they made these discoveries they went to his liaison, Amber Wallace.

SAM DANIELEWSKI

Once I found out about the detention center, I went to Amber with it. And to her credit, she told me straight out that I was right. She thanked me for my assistance and left. Honestly that "thank you" nearly killed me.

HAILEY FROND

Shortly afterwards, Sam left the parks service.

SAM DANIELEWSKI

I couldn't do it anymore. That office had just become polluted after that. I took some time off. I wish I could say I found some way to make it right, but how do you balance the scales on that? Twenty thousand people. And I can hardly remember any of them. I check in on the handful of files I kept, just to feel them moving. Not all of them do.

HAILEY FROND

Sam runs a non-profit that focuses on reuniting families with lost loved ones. They named it Compass, after the call sign they received on 7/20. They are headquartered in Denver, Colorado.

ETHAN

The Heroic Legion has narrowed its search for Tower Two down to two cities; Los Angeles and Seattle.

DEIRDRE WILSON (CONT'D)

(then)

While Los Angeles welcomes future development from the Legion, residents of Seattle have taken to the streets in protests at Legion outposts across the city. Concerns range from the increased risk of supervillainy to the rising cost of local rent. Seattle is only one of many cities that have become resistant to the Legion's presence in recent weeks.

(then)

A nationwide poll of 800 Americans found that trust in the organization has fallen since the imprisonment of Cosmos and the Babylon incident. To learn more we spoke with Beth Campbell, partner at American Research Media Specialists.

SFX: Office Walla.

BETH CAMPBELL

The Legion hasn't seen approval numbers this low since the Vigilante Riots back in 1977.

(then)

Back then it was an issue of public trust, rectified by Heroes registering with the state, but now it seems to be an issue of celebrity. Cosmos changed things, he was the poster child for dependability. People trusted Cosmos and felt safe with him. With him in the Legion, they shined in his reflected glory until they were able to win the public's trust in their own right. But now it seems that without him, the Legion just doesn't carry the weight they once did. The Babylon incident is a tragic example of that.

(adding)

The Legion doesn't have a lot of choices here. They would have to find someone as popular as Cosmos to regain the good will that's been lost.

Back to studio.

DEIRDRE WILSON

The President cited the polls in a tweet, stating that organizations like the Legion bear responsibility for violence brought on by aliens like Cosmos.

(then)

The Heroic Legion declined to comment on the protests and the President's remarks.

UNDERWRITER

That was Deirdre Wilson reporting from Washington. It's 74 degrees here in Paradise City. And now back to These American Supers...

ETHAN

(pause)

(pause)

The days can be quite long and dreary, and none of my clients are people I'd query. But it earns me a living so I can feed my cat, and pay my apartment rent, and the occasional hat.

(pause)

So at quitting time with the rest of the people, I pack myself into the L train and apologize to the rabble, who are wedged in there with my knees in their kidneys and my rear, at their face level.

Back at home my husband asks how was the day, and I answer with: "fine" and he with "OK". If this doesn't strike you as passion, you'd be right.
